We also have five new additions to our class. Rainbow and Cotton Candy but the others have not been named yet. The children love them dearly and will each take turns in feeding them.




The children will also learn how to care for them and change the water. Being responsible for pets teach the children so many life skills. While the children snack, the fish are fed. We are so lucky to have them.

This month in Global Perspective class we have been developing our research skills!










MATHEMATICS




