
Learning about animals' needs and how to care for them in a real-life context.

### SHAPE EXPLORATION





In Reception class, we've had a fantastic time exploring shapes! We began by learning about 2D shapes, using play dough to create and model different shapes like circles, squares, and triangles. The fun continued as we drew these shapes in shaving cream, allowing the children to trace and identify them with their fingers.

As we moved on to 3D shapes, the children eagerly worked with sticks and marshmallows to build cubes and pyramids. This hands-on approach helped the children understand the differences between flat and solid shapes while enhancing their creativity and fine motor skills. It's been an exciting journey in shape exploration!

In our Science lessons, Year 1 students explored the fascinating world beneath our feet, as part of our "Planet Earth" unit on soil. They began by investigating the composition of soil, discovering small rocks, leaves, dirt, and twigs. Unfortunately, we did not see any worms!



This led to a discussion on whether soil looks the same everywhere, and which solid would be best for living things, sparking curiosity and critical thinking. To test their ideas, students examined soil from different areas around the school, using their senses to observe its texture and appearance. Through hands-on exploration, they identified key differences and even washed away dirt to better understand soil composition. Finally, they applied their findings to determine which type of soil is best for plant growth and which may not be suitable. This engaging investigation helped students appreciate the diversity of soil and its importance in nature.








This month, Year 2 have been buzzing with excitement as they dove into the fascinating world of robots in English class!





















## HHO'S YOUR HERO?
